



True to this legacy, the Erika Heller Foundation made a generous gift to support children receiving care at Orillia Soldiers' Memorial Hospital. The special donation allows for the purchase of a new ultrasound machine for the paediatric department in OSMH's Regional Women and Children program.

The ultrasound will assist our paediatric care team with guided intravenous (IV) access. Establishing IV access is an essential and high-priority nursing procedure that can be challenging. Utilizing the ultrasound machine will reduce discomfort and allow for a more calming experience for young patients, something every caregiver can appreciate for their little ones.

The new ultrasound will also support additional departments in the hospital including Surgical Services and the Emergency Department.

This thoughtful gift will enhance the overall care experience for young patients and their families.





Transforming Senior Care: Wayhome Unit Unveils New Palliative Care Room

This year, a generous family foundation made a \$600,000 donation to support senior care in Orillia. With their gift, the Harvie 2 Wayhome Unit has opened the hospital's only palliative care room, and enhancements to the patient recreation room are underway. These improvements will greatly enhance the quality of care and comfort for both patients and care teams.

Though healthcare professionals can provide excellent support to patients and families during their last hours, it is incredibly impactful to have a dedicated space for palliative patients to rest comfortably with family.

Still to come, the recreation room, named "the Lodge," will enhance the patient experience and provide more opportunities for therapeutic recreation.

These updates to the Wayhome unit provide patients, caregivers, and healthcare providers with a more comfortable environment and improve the well-being of everyone. On behalf of the Wayhome Unit team and the patients it serves, we thank our donors for their investment into senior care in our region.

A Lifesaving Connection

My Unexpected Journey with Orillia Soldiers' Memorial Hospital

My name is Terry. I moved to Orillia about two years ago. I was familiar with the area, having spent 15 summers here when my kids were little. One highlight was going to Robbie's convenience store for ice cream, and I'm pleased to see it's still around.

When I decided to move to Orillia, I wanted to feel connected to the town. I considered various organizations to help and met a lady who volunteered at the hospital. This inspired me to apply as a volunteer at Orillia Soldiers' Memorial Hospital.

Volunteering at the hospital has been delightful. Though I had never volunteered before, I was welcomed warmly, and it felt like a natural fit.

Despite my regular visits as a volunteer, I never imagined needing the hospital's services. However, after a life-threatening fall from my roof last August, the hospital I had been dedicating my time to became crucial for my recovery.

After hitting the ground, I was unconscious. Thankfully, my neighbour saw the fall and called 911. Paramedics rushed me to Soldiers'. Dr. Odlozinsky, the on-call emergency doctor, quickly realized the severity of my injuries. I was diagnosed with a brain bleed, broken ribs, a split spleen, and a collapsed lung. He ordered my immediate transfer to a trauma center in Toronto, a decision that saved my life.

My journey didn't end there. After emergency treatment in the city, I returned home and spent nearly six weeks at Orillia Soldiers' Memorial Hospital's rehabilitation department for physical and occupational therapy. Julie and Luanne were excellent in helping my recovery, reassuring me that things were progressing well.

As my health improved, I resumed my weekly volunteer work at the hospital, even with a cast on. This ordeal gave me a new perspective on the hospital. I saw how interconnected each department is in assisting with patient care and recovery. I didn't want to stop volunteering because I felt more connected to the hospital, knowing firsthand the level of excellence it provides.

Looking back, I never thought I would need to rely on Soldiers' for my own care, but I am thankful the hospital was there when I needed it. I'm grateful for all the care I received from the doctors and staff at Orillia Soldiers' Memorial Hospital.

There are 4 levels to the Soldiers' Honour Program - bronze, silver, gold, and purple. A new honouree will start with a bronze recognition pin and move their way up to purple with each nomination. Along with the pin, honourees receive a certificate with comments from the donor to showcase their care.



To support Orillia Soldiers' Memorial Hospital as it adapts to the evolving needs of our rapidly growing communities, the Foundation created the Infinite Possibilities Fund.

The Infinite Possibilities Fund supports the current critical needs of our hospital today while advancing opportunities for a brighter future. With this new fund, our hospital can continue to provide a high standard of care to our communities and focus on advancing care opportunities in the future.

The Infinite Possibilities Fund was formally launched in October of 2024. An intimate group of community supporters joined us for an Evening of Infinite Possibilities, hosted at Braestone Farm, to talk about the strides our hospital has made in the past, where we are now, and where we want to be in the future.

Our goal was to inspire our generous supporters to think beyond short-term goals and build an enduring legacy with lasting impact for our communities.

ADVANCED CARE CLOSER TO HOME

Every year, OSMH identifies its priority equipment needs. These items replace outdated, end-of-life equipment and provide enhanced services for our regional programs.

CANCER CARE CLOSE TO HOME

Cancer is diagnosed, treated, and prevented, at OSMH. The demand for cancer care is increasing; we need to build strong, fulsome care around detection, prevention and treatment plans so patients can continue their care close to home.

WOMEN AND CHILDREN CARE

OSMH's Regional Women and Children Program services six community hospitals in North Simcoe County and Muskoka. Patients are referred for the Level II NICU, birth, cancer treatment, diabetes education, and lifesaving medical attention.

SUPPORTING SENIORS

Across Simcoe County seniors over the age of 65 account for 20% of the population. OSMH continues to see an increase in older adults needing long-term hospital care, and each patient needs a specialized care plan.

FUTURE OF OSMH

OSMH has outgrown its aged and undersized facility, and the hospital has been running at over 100% occupancy in every department. A larger, modern hospital is urgently needed to ensure the continued delivery of high-quality healthcare for our rapidly growing community.




